And the Fruit of the Spirit is Love -

It is by no accident that the first in the list of Fruit of the Spirit is Love. When the disciples asked Jesus "What is the Greatest of the Commandments," He responded: 'Love the Lord your God, with all you heart, with all your strength and with all your might. (Matthew 22:37) And the second is like unto the first - Love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:39) Love is of the Spirit. This is the Spirit every Christian receives when upon confession of faith in Jesus, the Christ, as Lord and Savior, is imparted into their soul.

So, the thought appeared on my mind - why does Paul state the Fruit (singular) and proceed to list nine attributes, OR is it LOVE and eight descriptors of the Fruit of the Greatest Commandment? Are the joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control adjectives which explain more deeply or explicitly LOVE? Each of these attributes, if you will, could have, should have been translated with a verb - the 'simple' verb is, i.e. LOVE is joy; LOVE is peace and so on. This expands the understanding depth of LOVE and the Fruit attribute is singular.

In the Greek there are four words used in the New Testament for 'love.' The Fruit 'love' here is *agape*. The Greek words translated 'love' in the New Testament writings are *eros* (romantic, passionate love), *philia* (intimate, authentic friendship), *storage* (affectionate, familial affection, and *agape* (love for everyone, God's love for man and man's love for God). [The Four Loves: C. S. Lewis]. This descriptive word, agape, appears more than 200 times in the New Testament. Jesus places a cornerstone of its importance when He makes it central in His "New Commandment." He states (John 13:34-35 NASB) "A new commandment I give to you, that you

love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." Jesus, without reservation, willingly gave His life for our salvation, our restoration to His Father.

This agape Fruit

Thinking of the Fruit LOVE: "LOVE is" broadens the meaning and life application. Pondering on this definitely deepens one's appreciation. However, checking the Greek original text - joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control are also nouns and not adjectives or meant to be. Perhaps if we look at these as a sub-set of nouns we can reach for a clearer awareness of each attribute. "Love is the key. Joy is love singing. Peace is love resting. Long-suffering is love enduring. Kindness is love's touch. Goodness is love's character. Faithfulness is love's habit. Gentleness is love's self-forgetfulness. Self-control is love holding the reins." (D. G. Barnhouse)

[Jesus said,] "By this all people will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another."

~ If I speak the languages of men and of angels, but do not have love. I am a sounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so that I can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. And if I donate all my goods to feed the poor, and if I give my body to be burned but do not have love. I gain nothing. Tove is patient: love is kind. Love does not envy: is not boastful: is not conceited: does not act improperly: is not selfish: is not provoked: does not keep a record of wrongs: finds no joy in unrighteousness, but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for languages, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end.

For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when the perfect comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child. I reasoned like a child.

Owhen I became a man. I put aside childish things. For now we see indistinctly, as in a mirror, but then face to face. Now I know in part, but then I will know fully, as I am fully known.

Now these three remain: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love.

Agape Love

In the list of spiritual fruit found in Galatians, the first fruit mentioned is Love. The Greek word used here is Agape. This word is often translated as a kind of love that is unconditional and focused on action as opposed to feeling. However, the word Agape is also translated as a meal often shared by Christians. We see this translation of the word in Jude, verse 12, in which Jude warns his readers of those hiding their true intentions whilst at their "Love Feasts" (ESV).

The most interesting part of this translation is not so much the verse it is attached to, but rather the invocation it lends to our view of God's love. God's Agape love for us is one that is not only expressed in word, but it invites us to join in a feast. His love gives us a seat at the table. So, when Paul tells us that Agape love is a fruit of our regenerate state, it is more than deep affection. Our hearts should be moved to offer even our enemies a seat at our "love feasts."

However, once under the cover of Love, all that the Spirit produces inside of the Christian is full of life and motivation. We can never fathom the depths of His love, but it is as graceful and peaceful, just like a dove.


We are all made in the image of God, His creation, His bride. And one day, we will be, by His side.
